

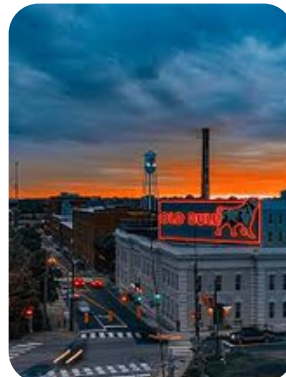

I was honored to be able to present my Recommended Fiscal Year 2026-2027 Central Pines Regional Council Budget to the Board of Delegates at the April Board meeting. The Board will be considering adoption of the budget during their May meeting.

Following my budget presentation, I developed two supplemental pieces to do a deeper dive on a couple important budget issues facign the Regional Council.

The first is around our Regional Long Term Care Ombudsman Program and the second is around our discretionary funding. I would encourage you to review both as they give you good insight into the type of work the Regional Council is doing and also some of the challenges we face into the future.

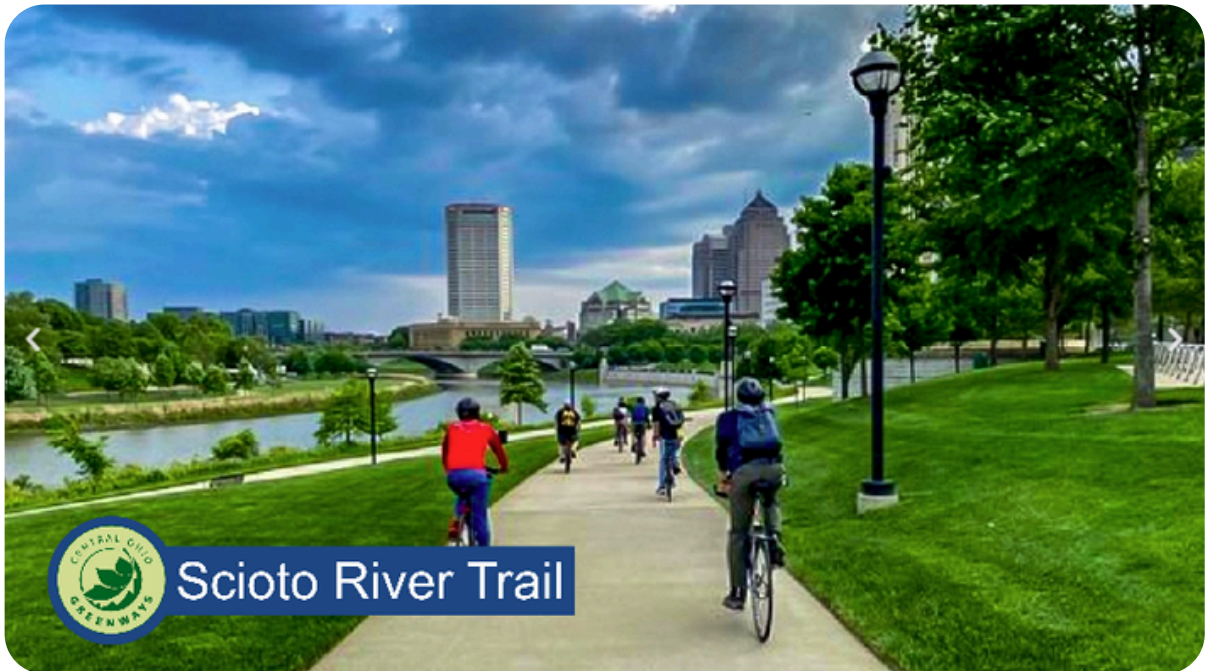


Major Metro Regional Council Highlight

Regional Trail Network

Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission

The Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission (MORPC) has built a regional trail network through its Central Ohio Greenways (COG) initiative. Established in 2015, the COG Board was created to address growing demand to expand trail mileage, increase access, and encourage trail use for all residents. What began as a roughly 230-mile network has grown to nearly 400 miles of existing trails spanning a 15-county region, connecting parks, neighborhoods, rivers, businesses, and cultural destinations.



MORPC has structured the initiative with strong intergovernmental and cross-sector partnerships - bringing together local government staff, elected officials, advocacy groups, and planning firms to advance regional collaboration, trail marketing, and funding development. The recently launched Trail Towns of Central Ohio program further demonstrates the initiative's breadth, convening an inaugural cohort of six communities for a year-long series of workshops focused on storytelling, marketing, and promotion to highlight walkable and bikeable destinations connected by the trail network.

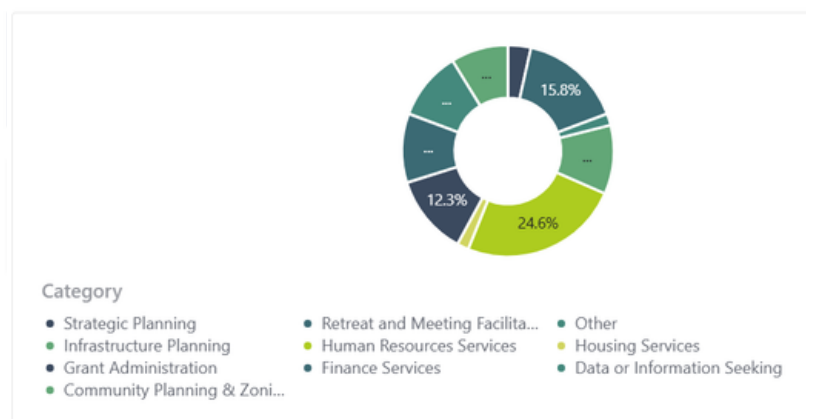
Local Government Member Request Dashboard

Our Member Services Team maintains a real-time Member Request dashboard that helps to track incoming requests from our local governments, rate of utilization by members, and emerging areas of need.

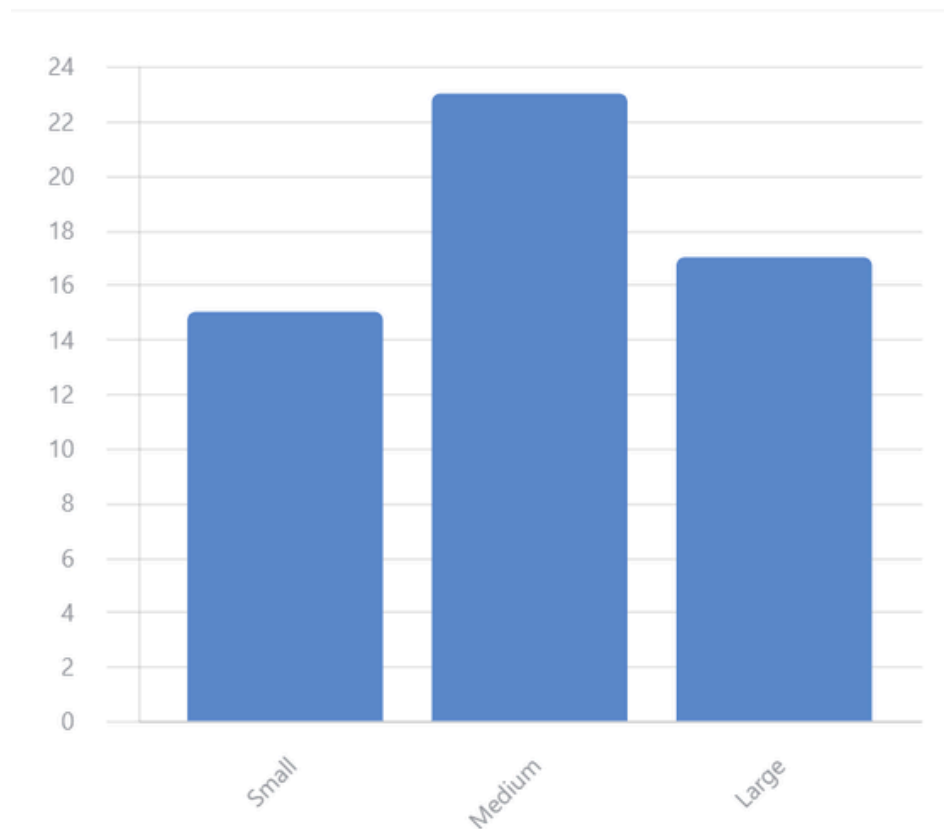

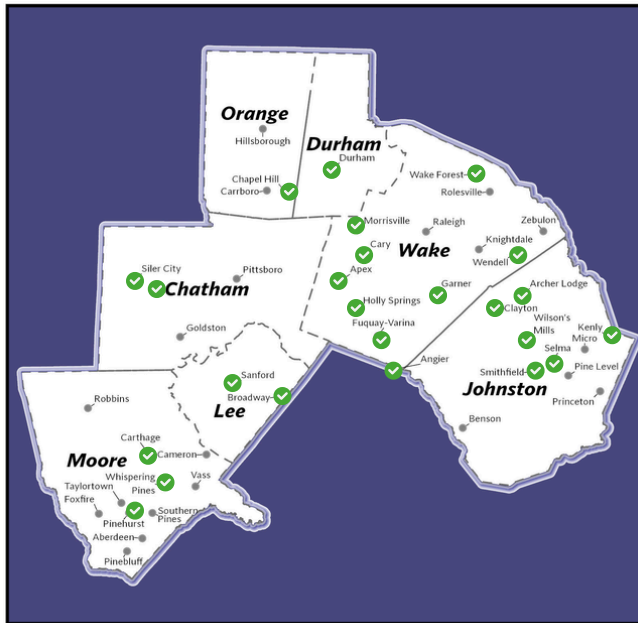
